Complete the enclosed **Ballot Selection Form.**Bring it to the Conway Clerk and we will issue you a ballot. Or mail it in the postage-paid envelope and we will mail you a ballot.

Traditional Absentee Voting:

Complete your ballot at home. Mail or deliver your completed ballot to Conway Township Hall. We must receive your ballot by 8 pm on Feb 27. Our Absentee Voter Counting Board will process your ballot. You can track your ballot through the entire process at

NEW! You can cast your early/absentee ballot in the tabulator at Conway Township Hall on any of these 10 days:

7 am - 3 pm on Saturday, Feb 17 thru Sunday Feb 25

and Election Day Feb 27 from 7 am - 8 pm.

Assuming short lines, the process will take 3-5 minutes. You can only cast your own ballot (not others in household).

Your vote will be included in the Election Night results!

NEW! 10 Days of Traditional Precinct Voting

Traditional precinct voting will be set up at Conway Township Hall for 10 days:

7 am - 3 pm on Saturday, Feb 17 thru Sunday, Feb 25

and Election Day Feb 27 from 7 am - 8 pm

The experience is the same on all 10 days.

Your vote will be included in the Election Night results!

Voter Tips



- Ballots are expected to be available beginning January 16.
- There is no precinct voting on Monday,
 February 26 (the day before the election).
- ✓ To avoid delays, always bring photo ID when requesting a ballot.
- If voting by mail, be sure to sign the back of your ballot envelope.
- Once your ballot is cast in a tabulator, it cannot be retrieved or changed.
- Secure, monitored, locked drop boxes are located in the Township parking lot and lobby. They are checked twice daily.

Q: Why do I have to indicate a party preference to receive a Presidential Primary Ballot?

A: Presidential Primaries are one of the tools used by the Republican and Democratic parties to help select which candidate they will move forward on the November General Election ballot. Michigan produces two separate Presidential Primary ballots, one listing Republican candidates and one listing Democrats. This is unique to Presidential primaries, and only occurs once every four years. Your selection does not indicate that you have aligned with one party or the other.

Q: What is the 'nonpartisan' or 'independent voter' option?

A: If you don't want a party ballot, you can return the Ballot Selection Form asking for a Ballot Without a Presidential Primary. You will receive a ballot only if there are proposals included in this election (none have qualified as of this writing).

Q: What is a Permanent Ballot List?

A: This is a huge change in ballot distribution. If you check the Permanent Ballot option on the enclosed Ballot Selection Form, you will automatically be sent a ballot for every election for as long as you are a qualified Michigan voter. This designation will travel with your voting record if you move to another Michigan jurisdiction. It replaces the Absentee Ballot Application List that requires you to complete a ballot application prior to each election.

Q: What if I receive a ballot by mail but want to vote in a precinct?

A: Another BIG change! Michigan refers to a mailed ballot as an 'absentee' ballot. If you want to cast the ballot yourself, you can request an absentee ballot, do your research at home, and fill it out before you arrive at your voting precinct. You can then cast it yourself (put it in the tabulator) by bringing it to the Conway Township Hall during any of the 10 days our precincts are open: Saturday February 17 thru Sunday February 25 from 7 am to 3 pm, and February 27 (Election Day) from 7 am to 8 pm. If you receive a ballot by mail and forget to bring it when you come to vote in the precinct, we will cancel it and issue you a new one (this may add a few minutes to your voting experience).

Q: How will I know if my signature wasn't accepted on a mail-in ballot?

A: Please, please, please give us your contact information including cell phone and email address. We don't share this information with anyone. EVER. We are required by statute to contact you if your signature doesn't match. If we don't have your phone or email, we will send a snail-mail letter to you which may not arrive in time to resolve the issue.

Q: What if I move and don't change my legal address? What if someone else's ballot is mailed to my house?

A: If you are on the Permanent Ballot List and don't notify the Secretary of State of your address change, we will continue to send a ballot to your old address. It's easy to make the change: contact your new Clerk or go online to DSVSESVC.SOS.STATE.MI.US. You will automatically receive an address sticker for your driver's license. If you receive a ballot for someone who no longer lives at your address, please let us know so we can cancel the ballot and initiate the verification process.

Q: What if I want my ballot sent to a different address because I will be away at school or on vacation?

A: We can help. Contact us with your alternate address information and dates that apply. We will ask you a couple of questions to verify your identity, then add you to our list for special handling. We are happy to do it, and it is critical that you contact us because **ballots will not be forwarded by the post office**. All returning ballots MUST arrive at the Clerk's office by 8 pm on Election Day. Postmarks are not honored except for Military and Overseas voters, who have an extra six days.

Q: Does Conway Township need more election workers?

A: We have a great team of election inspectors and welcome your interest in joining us. These are paid positions, interesting, fun, and civically satisfying. Please send us an email if you are interested!
